



Waimea Middle School Public Conversion Charter School (WMPCCS), located in Kamuela on Hawai'i Island, is a public conversion charter school in partnership with partner.

WMPCCS serves a diverse population of approximately 250 students in grades 6-8 as the primary public middle school in the region. Sixty-two percent (62%) of our students qualify for free or reduced lunch. Native Hawaiians make up the largest ethnic group attending WMPCCS (55%). Eleven percent (11%) of our students receive special education services, 4% are English Language Learners, and 22% qualify for the Migrant Education Program.

The school uses the middle school model to “empower all students with the skills, values, and cultural understanding to navigate high school and beyond.” (Mission) In addition to core curriculum aligned to the Common Core State Standards and the Next Generation Science Standards which the science department is beginning to implement, students participate in leveled reading classes, and AVID instructional strategies are implemented school wide to best support student learning.

Our new STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts/'Aina, Mathematics) Learning Center (Keaoakea) opened in January 2018 and has expanded opportunities for place-based, project-based teaching and learning as well as increased professional development and family/community engagement. 'Ike Hawai'i initiatives and the Mala'ai School Garden provide hands-on experiences that are integrated with curriculum. Free before- and after-school tutoring provides reading and math content support as well as homework help to our students succeed.










