

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

SUBJECT: Integrating Peace Education Into the School Curriculum

REFERENCE: HCR 055, HR 035, SR 093

ACTION REQUESTED: Report on feasibility of subject matter.

DOE REPORT:

Introduction:

These resolutions urge the Department of Education to study the feasibility of integrating Peace Education into the school curriculum.

It is important to understand what Peace Education is. Though definitions vary, the following definition from Peter Lucas, Teachers College, Columbia University, gives the scope under which Peace Education may fall. He writes:

“Essentially, peace education is the transmission of knowledge needed to achieve and maintain both negative and positive peace. It is also about developing the critical and reflective capacities to apply knowledge in order to control, reduce, and eliminate various forms of violence.

Negative peace refers to the practices to limit and prevent war and collective violence. Positive peace is more concerned with establishing life-long and life-enhancing human rights values as a necessary pre-condition to peace. Presently, in the schools, peace education includes programs such as diversity education, character education, peace and justice education, conflict resolution, civic and democratic education, and violence-prevention education.”

In many schools, the themes addressed in Peace Education are part of the curricula in Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Language Arts, etc. Such themes as caring for the environment and addressing hunger and homelessness can be incorporated into many content areas. When addressed in this manner, Peace Education is placed in a natural context and the learning is connected in a meaningful way. Many educators agree, however, that to be effective, a systematic approach must be taken, as opposed to a one-day approach where lectures, skits, etc. might be presented.

FINDINGS:

Currently, the Department of Education has many supports in place to enhance character education. Among these are the Peer Education Program (PEP) which examines issues of teens and encourages peer mediation in areas like conflict resolution. The Hawaiian Studies *kupuna* program encourages students to practice values like *Ho`opono`ono* (healing process), *aloha* (respect and love for one another), *lokahi* (unity), and *malama* (taking care of self, environment and people). Physical Education, too, addresses Peace Education through the ideas of sportsmanship. The Hawaii Content and Performance Standards III (HCPS III) in Social Studies ensures that

students understand how to deal with ideas of power and authority in the elementary grades. In middle and high school, students critically examine the consequences of conflict, both at home and in the global society. In addition, the General Learner Outcomes (GLOs), embedded in all curricular areas, address Peace Education by defining what all students should know and care about.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Department of Education will continue to embed Peace Education in all curricular areas. The Department will make available a bibliography of online resources, both general and specific, for all grade levels (see attached). This list of resources includes the Matsunaga Institute for Peace at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. In addition to hosting a resource center that is open to all members of the community, schools may contact the Institute to request a speaker for their classes.

The Department of Education will distribute this list of online resources to all participants at the Social Studies Statewide Leadership Training Sessions held each spring and fall. It will also be placed on the DOE website. In addition, a memo from the Superintendent, alerting teachers to this resource, will be sent to all principals for their review.

Because of the above supports in place for Peace Education, the Department does not recommend a separate curriculum, and no further action is required by the legislature.
