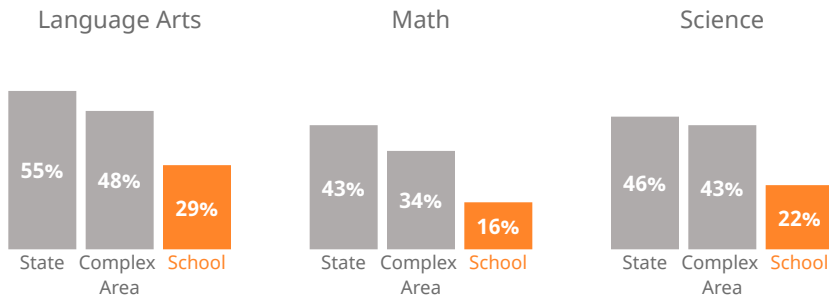

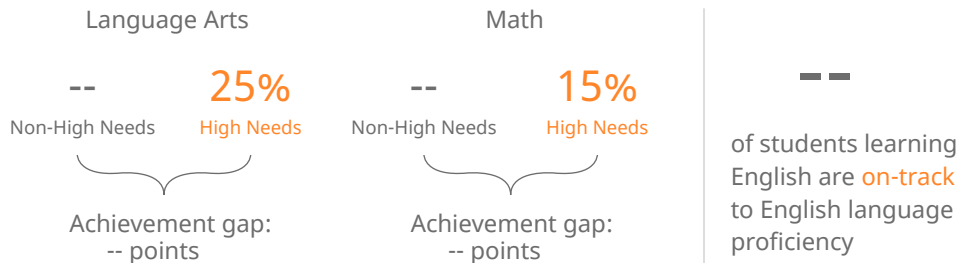

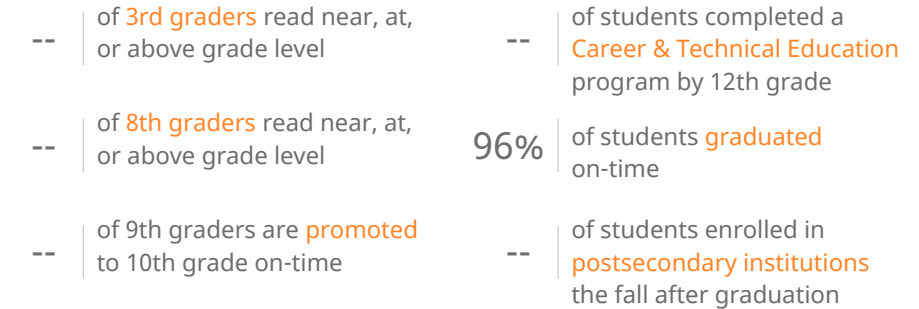

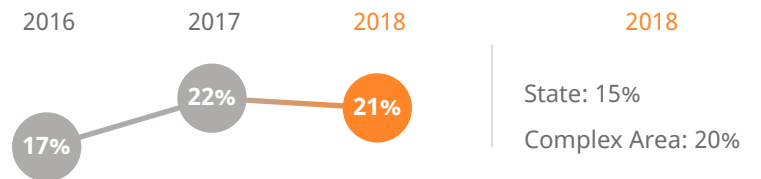

Our Story

Ke Kula 'o 'Ehunuikaimalino is a K-12 Hawaiian Language Immersion school located in Kealakekua on Hawai'i island. It is one of two K-12 public school campuses in the state that are part of the network of kaiapuni schools. 'Ehunuikaimalino is committed to perpetuating the language, customs, traditions, skills, spirituality and character of Native Hawaiians.

The school serves students from Waikoloa to Na'alehu who are committed to learning and using the Hawaiian language on a daily basis. Students are instructed in the Hawaiian language for grades K through 12. An hour of English is introduced in grade 5 and continued in grade 6. The secondary school currently delivers content in both English and Hawaiian due to a lack of proficient licensed teacher, but is consistently moving toward a full immersion environment. Hawaiian Language Arts is a mandatory course for all secondary students as it is not viewed as an elective.

Established in 1995, the school has relocated several times and is currently in a self-contained campus in the ahupua'a of Kalukalu. The 'io or Hawaiian hawk, which lives in the forest surrounding the school is the school's mascot. The 'io is a part of the design on students' uniforms worn on a daily basis. Student uniforms are in the school colors of red and yellow.

Parental participation is encouraged through Ka Wehena (Open House), Parent Teacher Conferences, Project Based Learning Ho'ike and grade level parent meetings. Parent representatives are needed on the School Community Council and the 'Aha Kauleo (statewide organization of Hawaiian language immersion schools).

How do you measure how well a school is doing? In our estimation, it's more than scores on high-stakes tests. Schools should show that they are supporting children along the educational pipeline toward college, career, and community readiness. Are our students attending school? Are they graduating? Are they going to college? And how successfully are schools reducing the achievement gap between high-needs and non-high needs students?

Initially created in 2013 by a U.S. Department of Education waiver from certain aspects of the former No Child Left Behind Act, Strive HI has been refocused by the goals and priorities of the 2017-2020 Department of Education and Board of Education Strategic Plan, the governing document for the public education system.

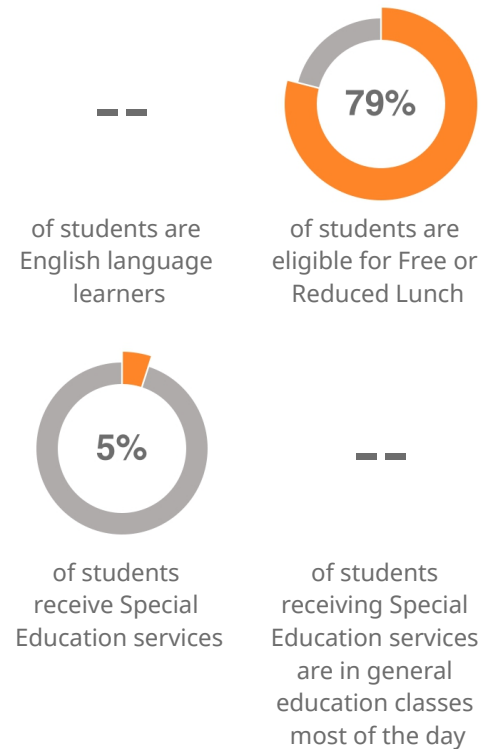
