


How many 3rd graders read on grade level?

Our vision is "E hoe i ka wa'a! E ho'olokahi e! Let's Paddle Our Canoe Together!" The wa'a or canoe has taken a significant place in our school and symbolizes a voyage or a journey that we must travel together with each individual doing their own kuleana (responsibility) to move our school forward. The image of the wa'a builds a sense of movement and interdependency on one another. The vision statement is part of our daily morning announcement and is captured on the back of our student uniforms. Keaukaha's mission statement is "Our Keaukaha Elementary 'ohana is devoted to ensuring a safe, caring, and culturally enriched environment that embraces and nurtures our unique Hawaiian community. We are committed to providing educational opportunities that allow our students to strive for excellence in becoming lifelong learners who are college and career ready." 


How many 3rd graders read on grade level?
